Christopher Columbus:


For many years, it was believed that Columbus was the first to reach the shores of the New World.

 Columbus's crew explored part of the Bahamas, Cuba, Haiti, and the Dominican Republic.




Columbus thought he had reached the far eastern part of Asia known as the Indies, so he called the natives, "Indians."

If Columbus had a detailed map of the New World, where did he get it? How did the mapmakers know the area if they hadn't been there and seen it first?


The Vikings:

- The Vikings were people from Norway, Denmark, and Sweden. They invaded Europe and settled in new lands including Iceland and Greenland.
- The Vikings claim to have discovered the New World before Columbus.

Around 986, Viking Bjarni Herjolfsson was on a journey from Iceland to Greenland. He claims that a violent storm pushed his boat to the shores of North America. But he did not stay to explore the area.



Then, around 1000 AD, a Viking navigator, Leif Eriksson, claims to have explored the coasts of Labrador and Newfoundland. Because he saw so many grapes, he decided to call it Vinland.



In 1957, a Vinland map was discovered that was created in the 1400s. It seemed to prove that the Vikings were in the Americas at least 500 years before Columbus.




- But as scholars have examined the map, they aren't 100% sure it is authentic.
 - Carbon dating of the paper shows that it is from medieval times which is consistent with the claim.
 - But the ink used to draw the map uses a chemical that wasn't commonly used before the 1920s, though there are other real historical documents that use small amounts of it.

The Chinese:


A man named Gavin Menzies believes that the Chinese were the first to land in the Americas and to circumnavigate the globe.



- From 1405 to 1433, the Chinese led many expeditions to other countries under a man named Zheng He, their chief explorer.
- Their boats were 600 feet long and very high-tech for the day. They even grew gardens on their boats!



According to Menzies, Zheng He made these voyages:



Menzies got his ideas from the following evidence:

The remains of some of the people of the New World from that time have Chinese DNA.

Animals and plants native to either the New

World or China have been found in the other land.

 Menzies believes he has found the remains of Chinese maps that show they explored that portion of the world. This map claims that it is a copy of a map drawn in 1418 and it clearly shows the New World.



- But written Chinese history will never tell us if they did in fact discover the New World first.
- All the records were destroyed when a new emperor came to power.
- China stopped building their amazing ships and stopped exploring after Zheng He.
